

# Report of the ALiSEA Network General Assembly in Cambodia

## Phnom Penh, 23 November 2022

## Introduction

The General Assembly is ALiSEA’s annual event through which it’s members can review the progress of the network and provide their feedback to ensure the network is working in the right direction for the benefit for all the members. The National General Assembly is a crucial moment to gather all members in-person, to discuss strategies and priorities issues, to learn from each other and exchanges about the future of the network.

The workshop was co-organized by GRET, Development and Partnership in Action (DPA), Cambodian Farmer Federation Association of Agricultural Producers (CFAP), DanChurchAid (DCA), ECOLAND Cambodia, and ActionAid Cambodia, as part of the ASSET project funded by the French Agency for Development (AFD), the European Union (EU), and the French Facility for Global Environment (FFEM).

## 1. Workshop Objectives and Participants

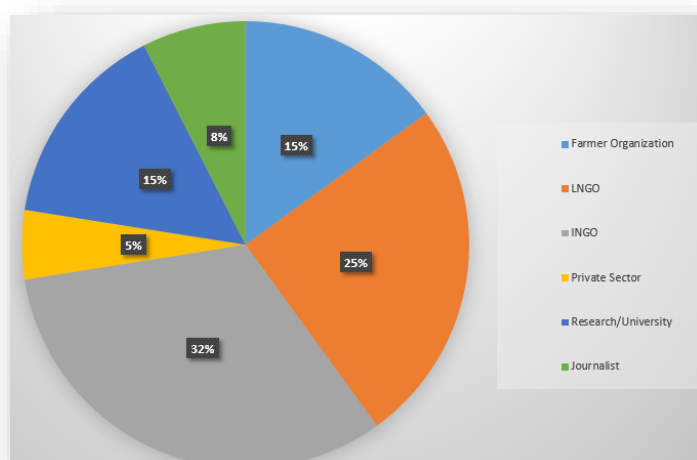
The National General Assembly aims to present the key achievements of the network in 2022, consult members on internal structuration and discuss the main action plan for the network in 2023 (*see the workshop agenda in Annex 1*).

The workshop objectives are as follows:

1. To welcome the new national secretariat and new members of 2022;
2. To present and share ALiSEA progress of 2022 and updates on granted organizations of the call for proposal 2022 from ALiSEA Small Grant Facility;
3. To consult with members on the different scenarios of the internal structuration;
4. To present and consult members on the ALiSEA Communication Strategy and action plan; and
5. To share the results of the national foresight and theory of change workshop (held in October, 2022) and consult members on the main action for 2023.

The event brought together 40 participants including 16 women of the ALiSEA network, working in the field of agroecology across the country, such as local and international non-governmental organizations, private sectors, networks, academic and research institutions and journalists (*see Participant List in Annex 2*).

### Percentage of Participants by Sector



The majority of the participants were from International Non-Governmental Organizations (INGOs). They represented 32% of the total participants, while the Local Non-Governmental Organizations represented 25%. The number of participants from Farmer Organizations and Research/University was the same 15%. The lowest percentage belonged to the private sector and journalists, with 8% and 5% respectively.

## **2. Introduction Session**

The assembly began with the welcoming remarks from Mr. Sok Sotha, CFAP/ALiSEA National Board Member responsible for Policy Dialogue. He started his speech by expressing the word “Thanks” for ALiSEA’s Board members, donors, and especially all ALiSEA members for their work and support to accommodate ALiSEA in the right position of agroecology in the Sub Mekong Region. His remarks highlighted some key achievements of ALiSEA including the significant role of the network, and the impact and need for agroecology in Cambodia. He said ALiSEA functions as a knowledge hub where everyone can share, exchange and learn. Therefore, *“while most rural farming communities in our region are being threatened by climate change, the war in Ukraine and the COVID 19 pandemic, we really need a clear policy on agroecology at the national level,”* said Mr. Sotha.

Then, the network warmly welcomed the new National Secretariat, Mr. Thol Buntha from DPA, who took up this position on 1st November 2022 and welcomed as well the eight (8) new organizations that joined the network in 2022.

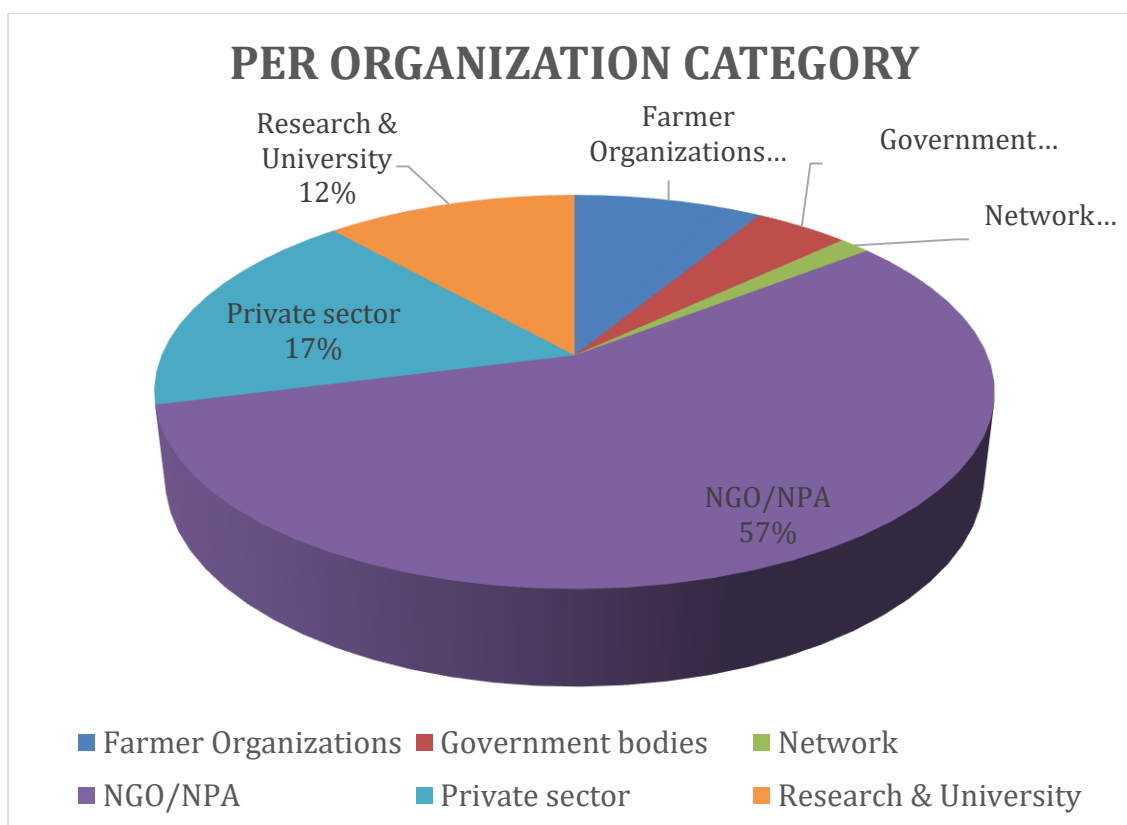

As of the meeting day 23 November 2022, ALiSEA Cambodia has 69 members that are from farmer organizations, government institutions, networks, NGOs, private sector, research and university institutions.



Next, Mr. Sok Sotha presented the current ALiSEA structure, knowledge exchange and experience sharing sessions and consultation workshops which were conducted by ALiSEA team, findings from end-users need assessment on ALiSEA website, update on small grant facility, the progress of the network partnership, and a brief ALiSEA next activities for 2023.

### 3. Small Grant Call 2022 Results and Next call

The regional and national results and lessons learned from the Small Grant call for proposal 2022 were presented by Ms. Manivanh Aliyavong (GRET Laos) as the following:

For this call, we received 22 proposals in total allocated nine proposals from Laos, seven from Vietnam and six from Cambodia. The ALiSEA network was pleased to announce the two awarded members of the 2022 call in Cambodia:

- Ecoland & Royal University of Agriculture (RUA: Multidimensional Evaluation of Agroecological Performance, Cambodia (MuLAgE)
- HEKS & Agri Smart Innovation & Kampong Thom PDAFF on Research and demonstration of climate-resilient and agroecological cashew nuts production

The MuLAgE research is to be implemented in Battambang province and the purpose of the project is to multi-dimensionally access and evaluate the agroecological performance of the ALiSEA members' farms in the Northern Cambodia for smallholder farmers' agroecological transition and propose solutions for upgrading the transition. Meanwhile the HEKS's project aims to find climate and pest resilient cashew variety and demonstrate innovative methods of agroecological practice of cashew cultivation.

The session was followed by presentation about MuLAgE research project by Ms. Mao Theara (Ecoland) and presentation of the next year ALiSEA Small Grant call for proposal by Mr. Mey Veata (Uni4Coop). Mr. Mey Veata claimed that the small grant topics for the 2023 call for

proposal will be based on results from the national Theory of Change (ToC) workshop in October 2022 and the ALiSEA’s Annual General Assembly.

One participant asked if his organization could apply to the next 2023 grant call for proposal while his organization was awarded a grant from the previous 2022 call? The facilitators answered “No”, because the number of small grants is limited in comparison to the total number of members, therefore we want to be fair to all ALiSEA members and provide opportunity and support to several members.

#### 4. ALiSEA Internal Structure and Organization

Presentation and brainstorming on internal structure and potential scenarios were led Ms Lucie Reynaud (GRET). Her presentation disclosed the objectives of the internal structuration and organization, results of the member consultation in July 2022, the three potential scenarios for discussion and the next steps for ALiSEA.

Following the presentation, all participants were asked to vote for the below four points with the answer “Yes”, “No” and “No Idea”. *(Note: the four points about the ALiSEA membership criteria and status were the results from the consultation workshop held in July 2022).* One organization could make only one vote for each idea.

- Welcome individual people based on specific criteria and set up specific role;
- Welcome specialized journalists/media organization as member;
- Set up 2 status/roles for members;
- Renew membership every 5 years.

As a result, the majority of participants voted in favor of the above points. A summary of voting result and participants’ comments on the four ideas is described below:

**(i) Do you agree to welcome individual people as members based on specific criteria?**

Should we accept individual people as member? What are the consequences and impacts? If Individuals people can be member, it will give them much more “decision power” according to the rule one organization equal one vote. Will they be able to apply to the Small Grant Facility?

Who are the individuals people interested and requesting to be part of the network? Why are they interested to join the network?

They are mainly professors, researchers and individual consultants/experts. They are interested to share their work, research and studies with the network as well as interested to develop close relationships with local and national stakeholders, to participate in discussions on national priorities, to be aware of the concerns and the dynamics of the agroecological movement.



On the other hand, individual people could be a real asset and resource person for the network, they are passionate people, who give their time to promote agroecology and share their experience. The ALiSEA network should remain an open and inclusive network.

***Decision:***

As a result of the discussion, members agreed that it would be important to add specific criteria for welcoming individual people and also to create a specific role or status for them like “ALiSEA Friends/Champion/Allies”. A compromise was reached as follows: They will be invited to participate in ALiSEA activities, and to the General Assembly but will not be allowed to vote.

**(ii) Do you agree to welcome specialized journalists/media organization as member?**

*Why journalists are interested to become members of the Network?*

Journalists want to expand their collaboration and access to resources about agroecology through which they could build their capacity on agricultural practices and farming systems, to improve and increase their reporting and media contents about agriculture and agroecology. Some media institutions have specific channels to report and disseminate information about agricultural news. If they become a member of ALiSEA, they could get to know and contact relevant stakeholders within the network and more easily find reliable information, data and sources for their news about agroecology.

***Decision:***

Journalists are crucial players to widely reach out and promote the agroecology to a large audience, particularly to the general public. Members agreed to welcome only journalists specializing in sustainable agriculture and agroecology and stressed the importance of developing a specific strategy to engage with journalists in general as part of the ALiSEA communication.

**(iii) Do you agree to set up 2 status/role for members?**

*Why should we set up 2 roles/status for members?*

At the moment, there is no minimum requirement for involvement in Agroecology promotion to be part of the ALiSEA network. We value and believe in the richness of diversity and the importance to work together towards sustainability regardless of the level of experience.

Nevertheless, some member organizations are inactive. Members define themselves as observers, responsive or pro-active. For the observers, it could be interested to have specific actions and involvement. Responsive and pro-active members are also questioning if observers' members should also have the right to vote as they don't engage and contribute to the network, why should they have the opportunity to take decision and influence the orientation of the network.

***Decision:***

The ALiSEA network will continue to nurture the diversity of practices, approaches and transition paces of its members. It will continue to broaden its efforts of inclusiveness and representativeness of the variety of stakeholders. This diversity of organizations leads to different needs. This could be an interesting way to tailor the services of the network to its members. Members agreed to set up different status for members.

**(iv) Do you agree to renew membership every 5 years?**

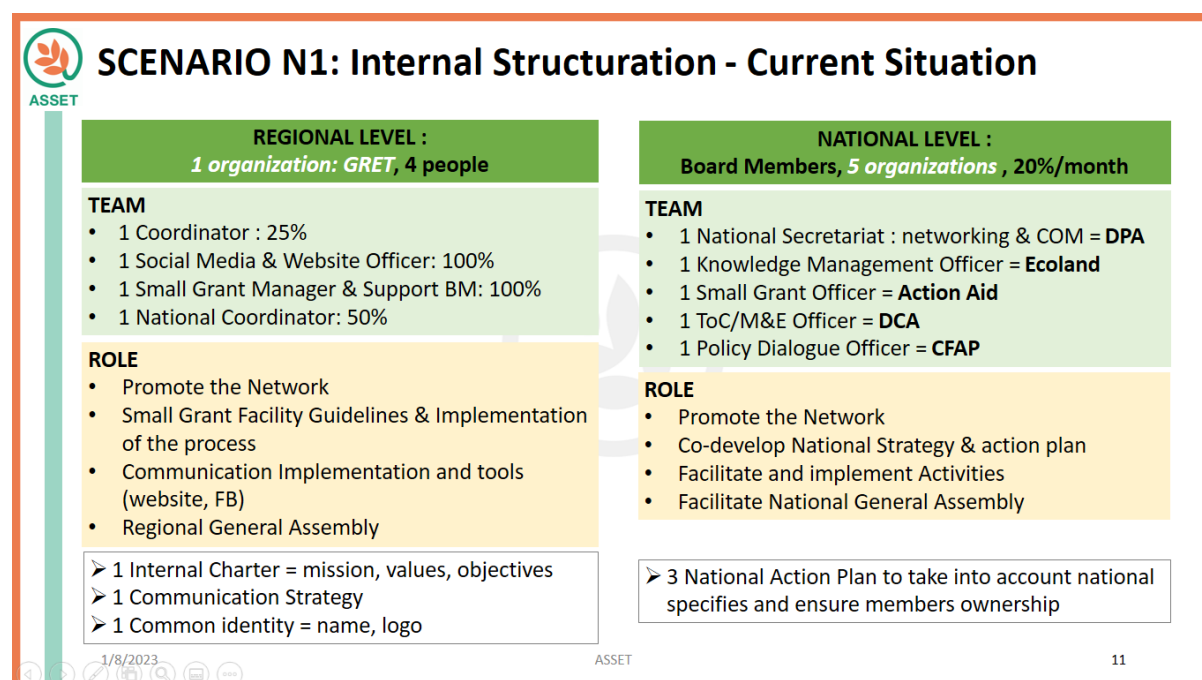
**Decision:**

ALiSEA’s Board Members should regularly follow up with inactive members if they are still interested in the ALiSEA’s membership. Members agreed to renew membership every 5 years.

**In the next section, participants exchanged and shared their opinions and feedback on the three potential scenarios of ALiSEA’s structure (See the three structure scenarios in annex 3). The objective of this section was to initiate discussions and collect suggestions, questions and possible concerns from members on internal structuration and governance of the ALiSEA Network. This is a long-term process; therefore, no decision will be taken at the end of this General Assembly.**

Comments of the participants on the three scenarios were noted as follows:

**Scenario 1: Internal Structure – Current Situation**



**Advantage:**

- Meeting with all Board Members before decision making (collective decision)

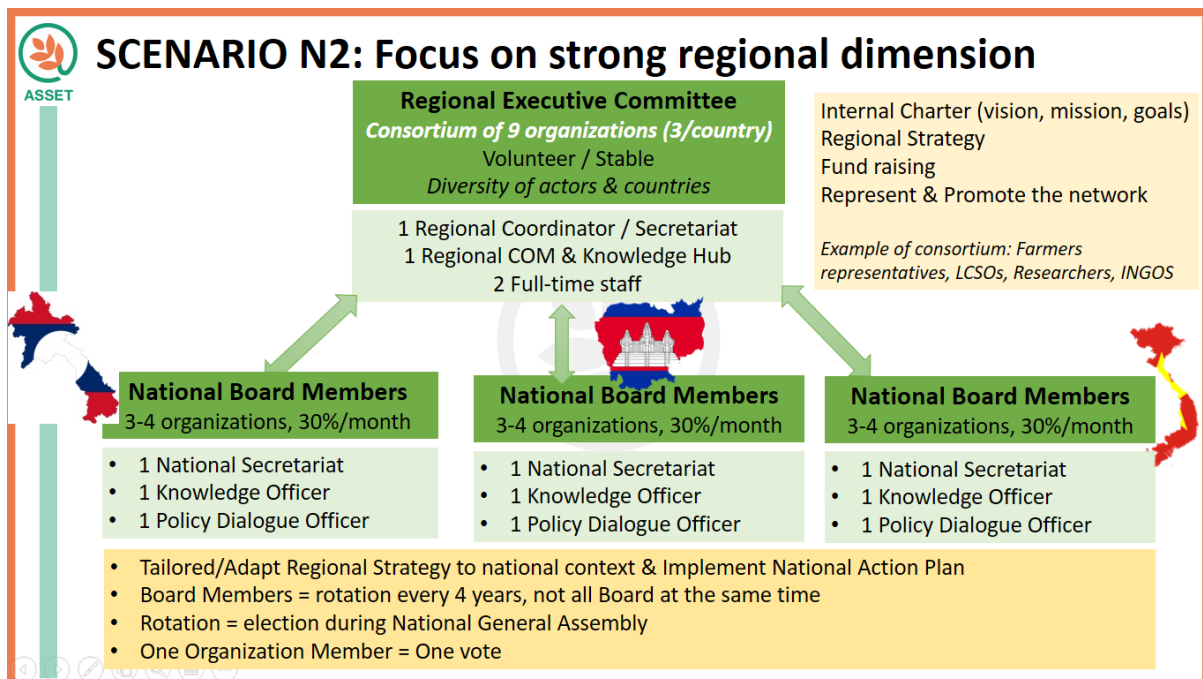
**Disadvantage:**

- Should set up a clear role of knowledge management at national level
- Not clear procedure regarding the role of national Board Members

**Comments:**

- There is no role of knowledge management at regional level.
- Generate knowledge, disseminate posts on platform (members)
- Support to members to develop and share on knowledge hub
- Board Members in Cambodia have clear position
- How regional level support to members (grants)

**Scenario 2: Focus on strong regional dimension**



**Advantage:**

- Participatory process and approach are very appreciated and should be maintained

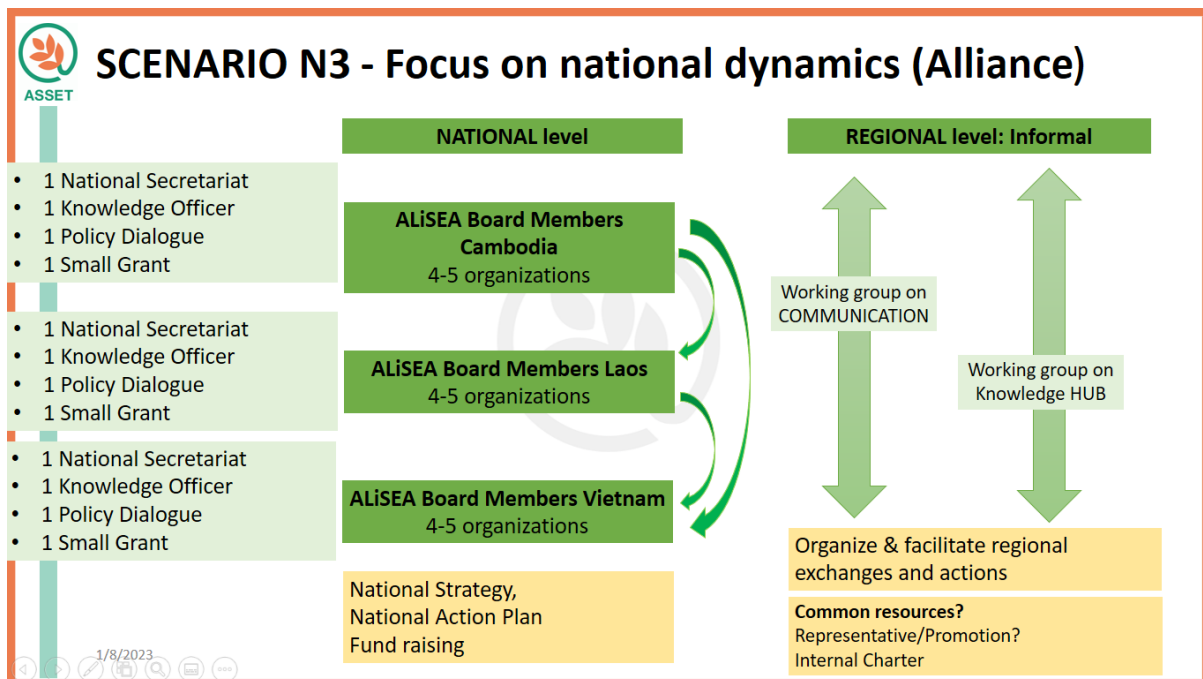
**Disadvantage:**

- National BM is not governance BM like other NGOs that they have volunteer BM for strategic decision (ALiSEA BM get % pay for their work)

**Comments:**

- Don't give up on national governance, highlight the importance of bottom-up approach
- There is a need for a clear action plan for BM (on-time investment)
- BM should be odd number to facilitate decision making, for example 3, 5 or 7
- National BM should have Chair, Deputy
- Regional BoM represent National BM and all members
- Regional BM open for members
- Clarify if the small grants still exist or not in this model
- Improve internal structure for both national and regional levels

**Scenario 3: Focus on national dynamics (Alliance)**



**Disadvantage:**

- Less formal working structure at National and Regional
- Impact to fund raising possibility
- Lack of united

**Comment:**

- Should have representatives at regional level

**Notes for all comments on the three scenarios:**

- There should not be only 4 organizations being part of the national Board Members. We should have 3 or 5 organizations in order to take decision based on the majority.
- Who will be part of the Regional Steering Committee? Will it be only organizations coming from the National Board Members and/or from Members? Which organizations can represent the network at regional level?
- We value the multi-disciplinary and diversity of organizations who form the National Board Members. We value the participatory decision process and bottom approach of the national Board Members. GRET doesn't take decision on its own.
- The national Board Members have a good background, history of involvement with the network which is a clear add-value to be part of the Regional Steering Committee. This criterion should be considered among others.
- The role of the Regional Steering Committee will be to give direction, the vision and to provide the strategic framework. The National Board Members are the implementers of this strategy at national level.
- The different scenario needs to be thoughts and discussed in line with the mandate and functions of the network. Do we want to implement different services with these different scenario? No, the question is which internal structure is the most appropriate to implement and ensure the same mandate and services.
- Does the role and actions related to Knowledge management officer should be kept at national level or would it be better to set up also this function at regional level?
- Have estimated budgets been developed for the three Scenarios? Not yet, it is definitively a crucial aspect that need to be further explored.

The ALiSEA network has two mandates on knowledge management as follows:

- To collect knowledge and information from its members, to organize it and facilitate access to large audience
- To produce and generate knowledge on its own.

## **CONCLUSION OF THE DISCUSSION ON THE 3 SCENARIOS**

### **Scenario No1 - Current situation, Members and Board Members appreciate:**

1. The participatory process and the bottom-up approach put in place to take decision and being consulted;
2. The different background and the diversity of the organizations who form part of the national Board Members (farmer federation, research center, NGOs);

### **Scenario No2 - Strong regional dimension, Members and Board Members appreciate:**

1. The regional framework to guide the strategy and orientations of the network;
2. The opportunities to provide common services (communication, knowledge management) and pool resources;

### **Scenario No3 - National dynamics, Members and Board Members appreciate:**

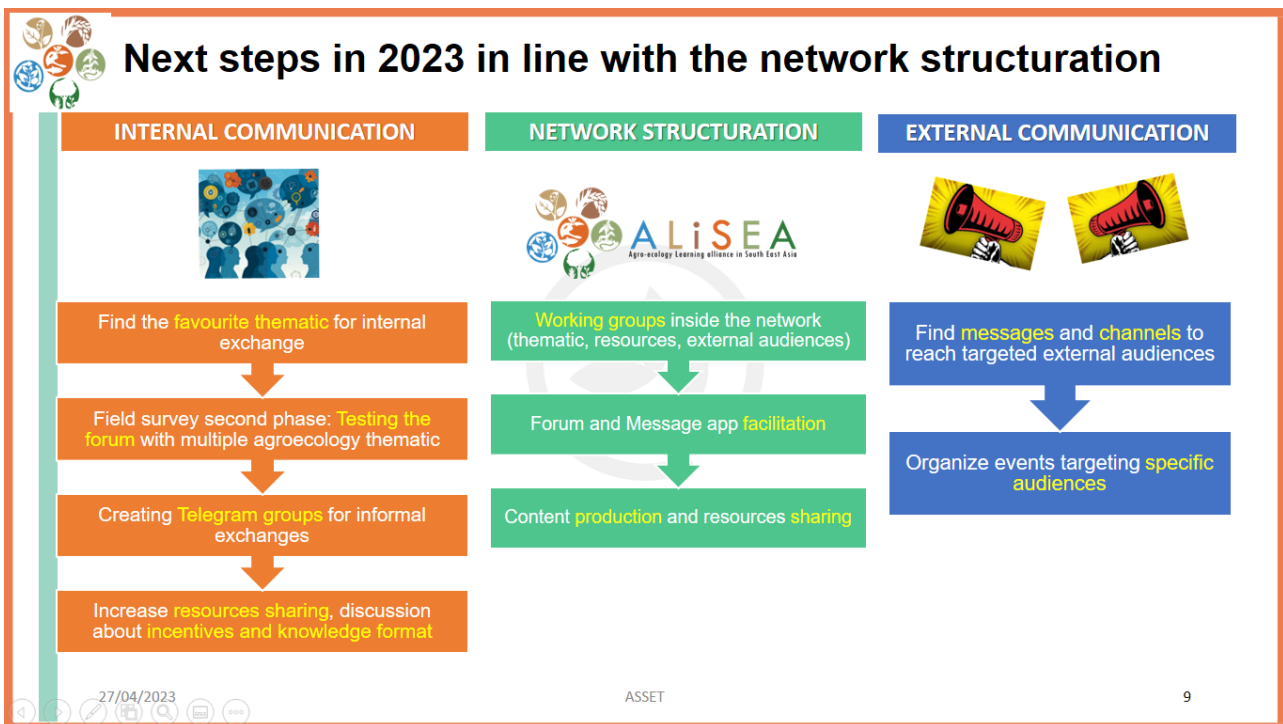
1. The power given to the National Board Members to develop their own national action plan and take decision.

### **Way Forward: Next steps to reach a decision on Scenario**

- 1) Consolidate and build on feedback and recommendations made at the General Assembly in the 3 countries: Cambodia, Laos, Vietnam (November 2022 – January 2023)
- 2) Online Regional Webinar to invite other existing Networks to share their experience and suggestions (tentatively April 2023):  
e.i: AFA, Earth Net, Education for Environment, WOCAT
- 3) Working Sessions between the national Board Members of 3 countries to develop a proposal (February to June 2023)
- 4) Present proposals and take decision at the Regional General Assembly (tentatively October 2023)

## **5. ALiSEA Communication Strategy**

The main outlines of internal and external communication strategy for ALiSEA were prepared with Mediaseeds and presented by Mr. Hou Sorith (Ecoland). The presentation covered the objectives and timeline of the strategy, insights of the needs assessment on both internal and external communication, results of the consultation in July 2022, and next steps in 2023 in line with the network structuration. The below figure shows the summary of the main communication activities for 2023:



Following the presentation, all the participants were asked to choose groups of external audiences in order to brainstorm how to target each group. Working sessions for the groups will be organized in 2023. The below table illustrates number of members who registered for each group. (see Annex 4 for more details about the group)

## 6. Taking Action for ALiSEA next activities program

The assembly was followed by presentation of the results of the national foresight and theory of change workshop (held in October 2022) by Mr. Pat Sovann (GRET). His presentation highlighted the objectives, participants and approach of the workshop, including results on present and future status of agroecology in Cambodia, transition pathways and expected results of the workshop.

### Comments and feedback:

Three major trends that shape the future of Cambodia should be included into the analysis:

- Uncertainty of energy availability and rising inputs price;
- The price of labour has increased significantly in recent years and continues to rise due to labour shortages in the agricultural sector;

- Water management is crucial resource for farmers to sustain agriculture production. With the concerns about the climate change, water availability and management may become a key issue in the future.

There is a lack of economic analysis and studies available related to Agroecological Farming Systems. There is a need to demonstrate that Agroecological Farming is productive and profitable.

It would be important to define our communication strategy and key messages for promoting Agroecological Farms, as the Cambodian government has decided to ensure low food prices to consumers and to protect the purchasing power of consumers as a priority. There will be no strong supportive policy to encourage a higher price for agroecological products. Therefore, some participants suggested that we should NOT develop our communication strategy around the message of “*Agroecology generates a premium price for farmers*”, but rather on “*Despite the first years of conversion and transition period which require investment, Agroecological Farms are more productive and profitable for farmers because of the reduction of external inputs and on-farm diversification*”. Discussions reveal the need to set up priorities and collectively define ALiSEA’s messages and recommendations. This highlighted the value of the previous section related to establishing communication working groups according to audiences.

In this session, participants were asked to vote for two priority pathways in order to further develop action plan for ALiSEA. As a result, three pathways received the most votes from the participants, and they were selected as the priority for ALiSEA. The below table reveals the vote result.

**After the above three priority pathways were selected, the participants continued the discussion in the plenary to determine next activities for ALiSEA in 2023. Members highlighted the following main activities:**

- Document agroecological initiatives (cases studies, videos);
- Organize training sessions and field visit for ALiSEA members (demo-farms, local & regional exchange visits, rotational exposer visits);
- Develop policy dialogue actions in strong linkages with the Farmers Forum and CASIC;
- Organize Agroecological Knowledge Fair to promote ALiSEA members actions and training materials;
- Define key communication messages on Agroecology for targeted audience notably students;
- Develop awareness communication tools to be provided and used by all members (Including producing quality agroecology’s video documentary (definition, practices, benefit);

- g. Organize events to raise awareness on agroecology products to consumers;
- h. Support small budget package for ALiSEA members; to develop AE knowledge products (video, case study, etc)
- i. Conduct joint study/research on marketing issues gap for agroecology products;
- j. Continue knowledge and experience sharing among ALiSEA members (farmers, private sector, research institutions/universities, PDAFF);
- k. Support Agroecology Best Practice Award Challenge for ALiSEA members
- l. Develop membership certificate for ALiSEA members

## **7. Conclusion**

The National General Assembly has been rich and fruitful paving the way for the internal structuring and governance of the network, taking decisions on the priority issues to be addressed by the network and main activities to be implemented in 2023.

As a way forward

- (i) at national level, the ALiSEA Board Members will develop a detailed action plan for the network building upon the discussions and outcomes of the General Assembly and
- (ii) at regional level, the first Regional General Assembly workshop will be organized in 2023 to take decision on the structuration and organization.




